





Establishment

- Started in 1991 by Presidents George H.W. Bush and Mikhail Gorbachev to expand cooperation in international conservation
 - advance local, national, and international understanding and conservation of the region's natural and cultural resources
 - support efforts to sustain the cultural vitality of indigenous peoples in the region
- Focus on international cooperation
 - Natural and Cultural Resource research in the Berinigia region
 - Cultural exchanges and familial reunions



The purpose of the SBHP is to advance local, national, and international understanding and preservation of the region's resources and to sustain the cultural vitality of its indigenous people. Specific programmatic goals are to:

- Improve conservation, sustainability, and knowledge of the region's natural and cultural resources.
- Preserve subsistence opportunities and other historic traditions and practices.
- Interpret and communicate about the region's unique and internationally significant resources and values.
- Provide opportunities for cultural connections and knowledge exchange.

Goal 2: Reinvent the proposal process to ensure strong connections with local communities and Indigenous cultures and highly impactful and lasting results.


Goal 3: Increase awareness of the program among communities and stakeholders throughout Beringia and within the National Park Service and the Department of the Interior.
