

Collaboration: Study of Environmental Arctic Change (SEARCH)

- Generates and synthesizes <u>research findings</u>
- Identifies <u>emerging issues</u> in Arctic environmental change.
- Provides <u>scientific information</u> to Arctic stakeholders
- <u>Facilitates research</u> activities, with an emphasis on addressing needs of decision-makers.
- Collaborates with <u>national and international</u> science programs integral to SEARCH goals.
- Regularly solicits research community input
- SEARCH Focus areas:
 - 1. Land Ice
 - 2. Permafrost
 - 3. Sea Ice
 - 4. Observing Arctic Change
 - 5. Scenario Planning

- Post-season reports, peer-reviewed article prepared




