Dynamic Model

Starting in 2017 we are accepting both pan-Arctic and pan-Antarctic sea ice extent (either one or both) of the September monthly mean. As in 2016, we are also collecting Alaskan regional sea ice extent. To be consistent with the validating sea ice extent index from NSIDC, if possible, please first compute the average sea ice concentration for the month and then compute the extent as the sum of cell areas > 15%.

The projected Arctic minimum sea ice extent from the NCEP CFSv2 model with revised CFSv2 May initial conditions (ICs) using 31-member ensemble forecast is 4.39 million square kilometers with a standard deviation (SD) of 0.35 million square kilometers. The corresponding Antarctic maximum sea ice extent is 20.80 million square kilometers with a SD of 0.23 million square kilometers.

### Brief explanation of Outlook method (using 300 words or less).

We ran the NCEP CFSv2 model with 31-case of May 2017 revised ICs. The IC was modified from real time CFSv2 of each day at 00Z by thinning the ice pack (based on test from previous years' sea ice outlook). If this thinning would have eliminated ice from areas observed to have sea ice, a minimum thickness of 10 cm was left in place for the ice IC.
